ROSWELL, Ga. — Fourth-graders at Roswell North Elementary School took part in the inaugural egg drop May 7 to test out their egg-proofing skills during their field day.

The students first dropped their eggs in self-made containers built from everyday household materials. If their eggs survived, the eggs

then were dropped 20 feet from a cherry picker truck provided by Meer Electric. If the egg survived that, it was then dropped 30 feet.

This was all done to teach the students about force and motion.
